The Careers Programme is made up of six strands:

<p>As part of the tutorial programme in Year 12, students explore their post-18 progression options, learn about HE, apprenticeships and the world of work, and how the skills they develop in college can support their preparation for life after New College. In Year 13, the tutorial programme provides practical support with making applications to HE, apprenticeships to employment and provides guidance on how they can manage their transition to the next stage.</p>	<p>Subject areas are expected to integrate at least one HE encounter and one industry encounter each year for all students who study their course. This usually takes the form of a trip, workshop or visiting speaker.</p>	<p><b>3</b></p> <p><b>EMPLOYABILITY SKILLS (OPTIC)</b></p> <p>Subject areas are expected to provide students with opportunities to develop their organisation, problem solving, teamwork, initiative and communication skills, and ensure that students reflect on and are aware of when these skills are developed.</p>	<p>Students on Double and Triple BTEC courses experience work placements or a series of work-related trips and visits as part of their course. All students have the opportunity to take part in work experience, both physical and virtual, and are supported to find an appropriate placement.</p>	<p>All students have the opportunity to meet with a Careers Advisor for one-to-one careers appointments.</p> <p>In addition, we regularly survey student career intentions and aspirations which allows us to provide appropriate individual guidance, intervention and support as the need arises.</p>	<p>This encompasses a wide range of activities and events that take place outside of subject lessons, including tutorials aimed at supporting students to make informed decisions and supporting them in making applications to higher education, apprenticeships or employment. The Y12 tutorial programme continues with a progression focus, with tutorials focused on the UCAS process, writing personal statements, building CVs and reflecting on skills and experiences gained so far.

College interviews for applicants continue into the Summer Term.

Year 10/11 students from our main feeder schools will be invited into college for a Taster Day. If you attend this day, you will receive subject related information about progression within each subject. As part of the event programme, you will also have a choice of career talks to attend in the afternoon.

All parents and carers are invited to our first 'Next Steps evening', with information about how college will continue to support students in planning for their next steps, be it Higher Education, Apprenticeships or Employment, and how parents can help too.

Students are signposted to Open Events offered by local and national universities.
